



Selecting an Assessment

Our scan identified a need for guidance on determining when digital literacy assessments are “a good fit.” The following questions can be helpful:

- **Question 1:** Is the assessment used for placement? Would a self-assessment suffice?
 - Examples: [mlearning’s self-assessment](#), goodwill’s assess your digital skills, and [the EU’s test your digital skills](#) self-test, available in multiple languages
- **Question 2:** Is it diagnostic to establish a learning plan?
 - Example: Northstar Digital Literacy Assessment
- **Question 3:** Will it survey achievement to monitor progress?
- **Question 4:** How frequently will learners be assessed?
- **Question 5:** Are the assessments formative or summative?
- **Question 6:** What is the content of the assessment focused on?
 - Technical skills: e.g., Microsoft and Google’s unit and course quizzes, Northstar, learning.com
 - Information literacy: e.g., Northstar’s using technology in daily life
 - Digital competence: e.g., piaac ps-tre
- **Question 7:** Is the assessment for the purpose of research?
 - PIAAC
- **Question 8:** Will it be used for program accountability?
- **Question 9:** How will the skills be assessed, scored, and reported?
 - Multiple choice or simulation (e.g., Northstar)

- Observation of performance scored against rubrics (e.g., casas coaaps)
 - Portfolio-based (e.g., nedp)
- **Question 10:** In which modality will the assessment be delivered, and can it be delivered remotely?
- **Question 11:** Is it updated to reflect current digital skills?
- **Question 12:** What is the cost of the assessment, not just in terms of licenses but in implementation?
- **Questions 13:** How can assessment results or badges be shared with employers or educational institutions?
- **Question 14:** Are there opportunities to certify specified skills, levels, competencies, and program completion?
